DISTRICT ENGLISH LEARNER AND REFUGEE REPORT: 2021-22 February 2022

The purpose of this report is to provide analysis of 2021-22 OPS students who participate in the English Learner (EL) program, speak languages other than English in the home, and are refugees to the United States.

KEY POINTS

- OPS K-12 students currently participating in the English Learner (EL) Program includes 10,061 ELs or 20.5% of the K-12 student population. About 29.7% of elementary and 12.2% of secondary students are ELs.
- EL services have been provided to 19,071 or 38.9% of the K-12 student population.
- The EL program has grown by 60% percent over the last 10 years. There was an 8.3% increase in students served from 2020-21 to 2021-22. The total K-12 population in the district also decreased by 2.1% over the same time period.
- There are <u>20,628</u> students in the district who speak <u>108</u> different languages other than English in the home, regardless of EL status. This represents <u>42.09</u>% of the total K-12 student population.
- There are <u>2.358</u> refugee students in the district coming from <u>17</u> different countries making up <u>4.8%</u> of the K-12 student population.
- The number of refugees is up <u>45%</u> over the last ten years with the largest growth coming from Southeast Asian countries.
- This report counts <u>95</u> Afghan students enrolled in the school district as of October 2021. As of
 January 28, 2022, the number of Afghan students in the district has grown to <u>178</u>, an increase of <u>87%</u>
 (83 students) in just three months. This number is expected to grow as families are settled in Omaha
 or relocate to the area.
